If someone forwards you an alarming message about an imminent danger such as a computer virus, bizarre crime MO, or a seemingly innocuous gadget that can turn murderous, you can always go to www.snopes.com, a website run by professional researchers/debunkers. They will track down the origin of any rumor they can and either verify it, clarify it, or prove it to be untrue. This is also helpful for dealing with rumors such as the one that Mr. Rogers was a Navy SEAL with tattoos all over his body (not true) or that Coca-Cola originally had cocaine in it (true).

If someone at your office (or on television or on the radio) makes a claim about a political situation that you think is doubtful, but you're not sure, you can go to www.factcheck.org, which bills itself as "a nonpartisan, nonprofit 'consumer advocate' for voters that aims to reduce the level of deception and confusion in U.S. politics." They, too, cite their sources so you can check for yourself if you need more information.

But how about the things we simply can't verify? How can we ascertain that when everything looks bleak and seems to be getting bleaker, that God is doing redemptive work? How can we be sure that when bad things happen, God has not abandoned us? How can we know for a fact that the ministry we are doing is doing any good?

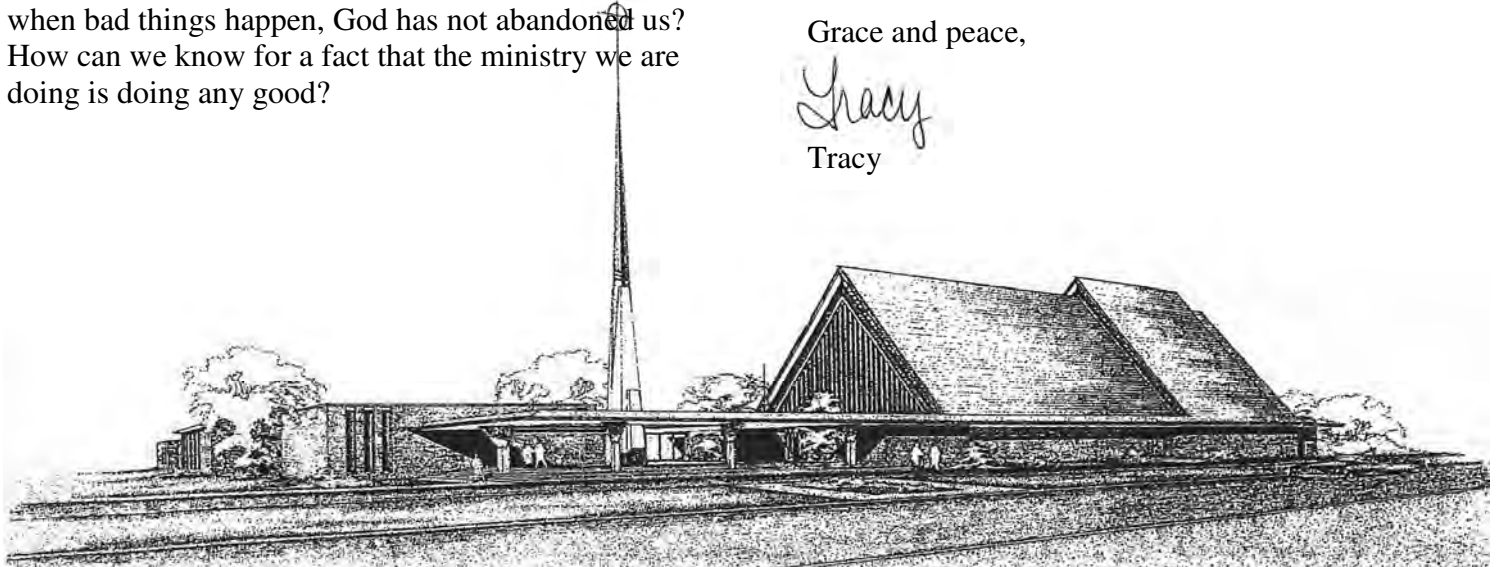
You could look up a scripture passage, such as, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) Or "Be strong and bold; have no fear or dread of them, because it is the LORD your God who goes with you; he will not fail you or forsake you." (Deut. 31:6) Or "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:6)

But in a day of fact-checking, video evidence, and electronic trails, we might want to see some further proof. Faith, however, "is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen," as it says in Hebrews 11:1. Faith means acting upon what we believe even when there is no visible sign that it is true at any given moment. Faith means believing that God's redemption is at work even when we can't see it. Faith means believing that God is right there even in the midst of the most desolate night. Faith means believing that sharing God's love in a tangible way can make all the difference in the world even when it just seems like one small token.

Sometimes, when it's hard to believe, we just have to take God's Word for it.

Peacemaking Offering Sun., Oct. 4
Give generously to support CHOICES and the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program. One quarter of the total offering will go to a group the Justice and Peace Ministry Team chooses: CHOICES – for eliminating domestic violence. Domestic violence increases in times of economic stress. The mission of CHOICES is to interrupt the cycle of domestic violence in this community and advocate for social change. CHOICES

defines domestic violence as physical assault, psychological abuse and/or sexual abuse between adult family members. Domestic violence cuts across all geographic, religious, socio-economic, racial, sex and age barriers. It is learned, criminal, generational, cyclical and correlated with substance abuse. It increases in frequency and severity within a relationship, yet is not a relationship issue. It is estimated that domestic violence occurs in at least one in four adult relationships in

the area CHOICES serves. No family member deserves to be abused by another family member. No family member has the right to abuse another family member. Everyone has the right to a violence-free household. CHOICES has a responsibility to adult victims of domestic violence. Intervention can help. Primary responsibility for the acts and behaviors of individuals belongs to those individuals. Secondary responsibility belongs to society.

New Old Piano

Covenant has been gifted with a Steinway baby grand piano. It was a gift from the estate of Eugene Cafege who lived on Mountview Rd.

Although a close neighbor of Covenant, he had no connection with the church as far as anyone knows. His wife was a pianist who died about 20 years ago. In his will Mr. Cafege instructed that the piano go to a Presbyterian church. His attorneys

contacted the closest Presbyterian Church, Covenant. The piano has the potential to be an excellent instrument, although it requires several thousands of dollars of work to make it so. It was evaluated by Benjamin Wiant, our piano technician, before the gift was accepted. Discussions are under way to decide what is the best thing to do with the two Steinway pianos now in Fellowship Hall. The other piano does not belong to the congregation: It is on

long-term loan from Greg Frink, son of Mary Frink. Greg intends to donate it eventually to a niece appropriately named Melody. Mary Frink was very involved in the music program here. She sang in the Chancel Choir, rang in the bell choir, played in the recorder group, and accompanied both the high school choir and the children's choir for many years.
