Our Scots Presbyterian heritage has been the stronghold, if not one of the sources, of the concept of the Protestant Work Ethic. What began as a way of shouldering responsibility in an effort to live into one's role as a child of God eventually slid down to a sad way of judging our lives: busy = worthy. We took our forebears warning that "idle hands are the devil's tools" and began to make busy-ness our constant state of affairs. We wear our weariness like a badge of honor. If we are not crazy tired and exhausted, we must not be doing enough.

It certainly comes from good enough intentions. We want to be people who work for good. We want to be people who help where help is needed. We want to be people who step up to the plate and do our part and share our bounty. Those are all noble aspirations. Where we tend to get into trouble is the barely discernible line we cross when we move from sharing our bounty to creating a fevered and false sense of self-importance.

I catch it in myself when I am getting frazzled and still have a long list of things that must be done. When I need to cut, my first inclination is to cut my quiet time, my prayer time, my time of sitting quietly with God and letting all else fall away. After all, when I am doing THAT, I am not getting anything done. Right? When I am doing THAT, I am not accomplishing anything, not checking things off any list, not making progress. Right?

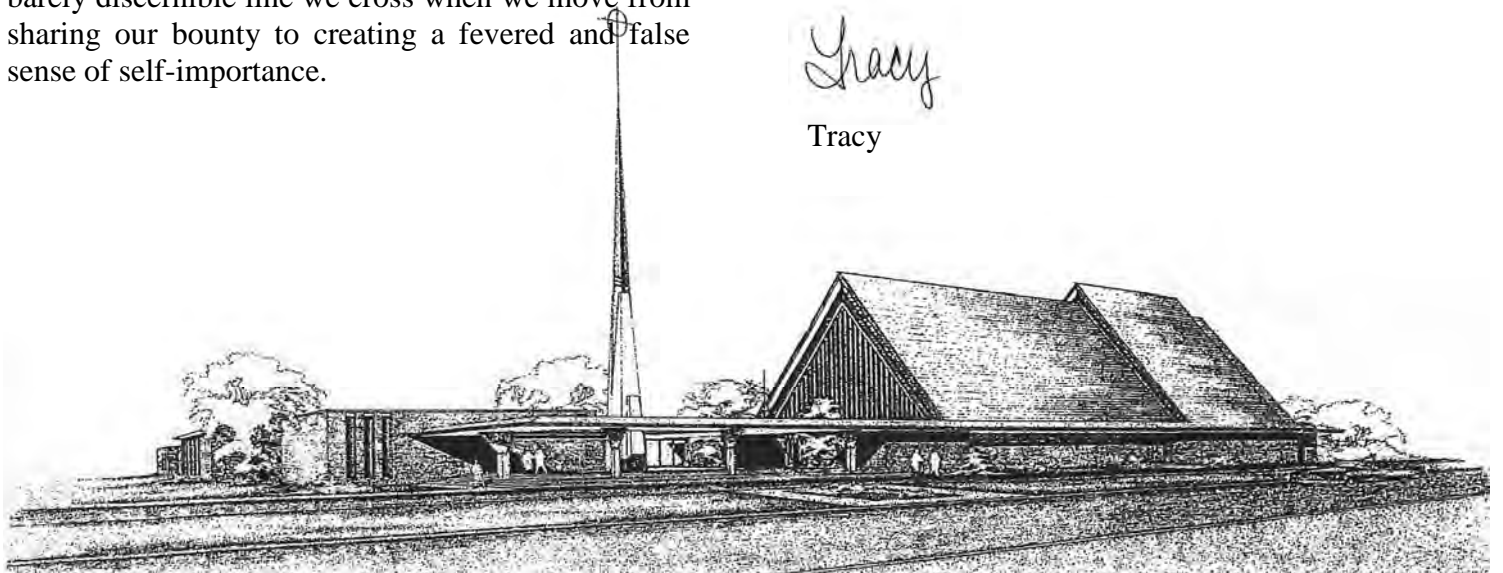
But here is also what happens when I cut my quiet time: I have a shorter fuse; I do not have wise insight into anything; I spend time on the wrong things and even those I do things shoddily; I jump to foolish conclusions; I discount others; I bemoan all the things I do that go unappreciated; I am less and less like Jesus.

Jesus was compassionate and selfless, but he often walked away from the fray in order to be refilled by God's limitless reservoir. It's something many of us have to learn again and again and again.

My prayer is that we can encourage one another in this.

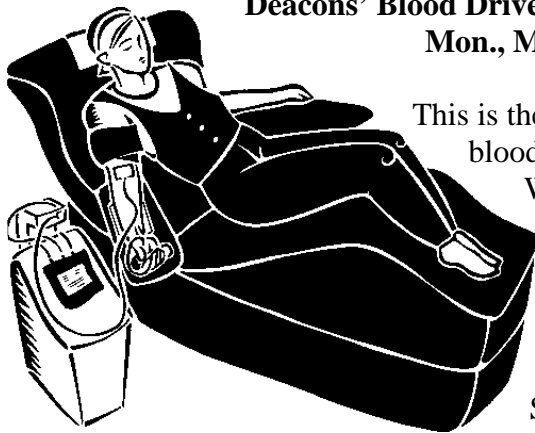

Prayer Shawl Ministry of Covenant:

2nd and 4th Fridays of each month, 9:30-11 am, Lounge.

Everyone is invited to be a part of this circle. We knit prayer shawls to be blessed with prayers and given to members and friends of Covenant when there is a need for prayers of comfort or prayers of celebration. If you are a beginning knitter, or not even a knitter yet, the prayer shawl is an easy pattern to learn, and there are a number of us who would be glad to teach you. For those of you who would like to knit shawls, but cannot come on Fridays, we can give you the yarn and you can knit at home. The basic pattern is: Using #13 needles, cast on 57 stitches. Then for each row knit 3, then purl 3, knit 3, purl 3 all the way across. Always begin and end each row with knit 3, if you have cast on 57 stitches. You will need three skeins of yarn, and we use the Lion Brand Homespun yarn. Each shawl will take 2½ to all of 3 skeins of yarn, 55 to 60 inches depending on your preferred length. When you are done, you can add fringe or a knitted ruffle on each end. Directions for the ruffle are available and can take 1/4 to 1/2 skein. Some add beads to the shawls.
