## Katie's Corner



Odds are good that you are familiar with Jesus's answer when someone asked him what the greatest commandment is. He quoted Deuteronomy, the Torah, the scripture that embodies everything the people of God needed to know to be in right relationship to God and to other people. He said, "Love the LORD your God with all your

heart and all your mind and all your strength." Many of us who have been in the church a while can recite this verse by heart. It's on the tip of our tongues. Love God.

But how? How do we love God? How does such a marvel happen inside us?

Many of us have learned that loving God can be borne out in loving others. We also remember Jesus saying, "If you love me, keep my commandments" and "This commandment I give you, that you love

one another." We do. We serve. We strive to treat others with compassion and grace, and, in this, we Love God. And this is good.

But is there more? Should our acts of service come from a deep and precious love within us? How do we nurture that? Perhaps loving God is also about an actual relationship with God. Perhaps God invites us to draw nearer to the source and strength of Love itself. If God is love, as scripture insists and Jesus embodies, then how do we come to know that love?

Prayer. Time spent with God. Being still before the Holy One. Opening our hearts and saying, with all the courage we can muster, "Here I am, Lord." Letting our desire for God well up into a simple movement toward God: "I love you. I want to love you. I need you."

What we do does matter. So does the state of our being. I want to be rooted and grounded in love, in God. As a disciple of Jesus Christ, I need to love God with everything I have, and to do that I need to seek God, to make time to be with God, to open my heart and invite God in. Together, and alone in quiet places, we, the Church, must pray if we are to love and love well.

## The Prayer Chain

We have a ministry of prayer at Covenant that responds to requests for prayer. Someone calls the church office or fills out a prayer request form, calls and e-mails are made, and some of our members turn to God with precious prayers for love, grace, healing and peace. These prayers may be for people who are sick or

grieving, lost or unemployed, addicted or sad, lonely or seeking. We all need God's aid in so many and various ways. Confidentiality and respect for privacy are essential to the integrity of our prayer ministry, so please ask the person being prayed for what he or she would like to have shared and what, specifically, our

prayers might be. Lifting one another up in prayer is a tender mercy, full of grace and trust, and should never feel like a violation of privacy.

## Deacons' Minutes Highlights

The Covenant Presbyterian Board of Deacons met in regular session on Tues., April 22, 2008, in the Lounge.

- Moderator Deb Marsh called the meeting to order. Gail Stadelman presented a musical devotion, playing "Amazing Grace" and Duo in E Minor" on violin while accompanied by Rudy Vazquez on flute.
- Signup lists were circulated for greeters, May devotions and to help at the May 18 Over-80 luncheon.
- Jim Mehler reported on those recovering from illnesses and surgery. He also mentioned the Presbytery of Scioto Valley hosting a veterans recognition worship service at Covenant on May 25.
- Treasurer Jim Buchanan noted the price of postage is increasing, so Deacons were advised to stay in touch with members by e-mail when possible.
- Deb read a thank-you note from Esther Curtis in appreciation for help after Dale's memorial service.
- The Super Ministry teams brought up that those attending the summer youth mission trip to Honduras are being asked to contribute another \$100. That does

not include shots, for which the 16 going on the trip are also paying.

- Deacons have not been asked to donate money, but it was disclosed that other commissions and ministry teams have been asked to investigate whether they could help with funding for the youth trip. Jim Buchanan made a motion that Deacons donate \$2,000 – pending ongoing fundraising by the youth which might impact that total - and allocate the money from the line item New Mission Challenge in the Deacons budget. The motion passed unanimously.
- Sue Campbell reported that there was a Caregivers luncheon on April 6. Another is set for May 18, and 104 invitations have been sent out.
- Proposals were handed in for the Outreach Challenge.
- Tom Hoover reported that COMPASS is back in business and has hired a new executive director. He has told COMPASS that Covenant wishes to continue its support and asked that the treasurer send a check.
- The next Deacons meeting is May 27 at 7 pm.

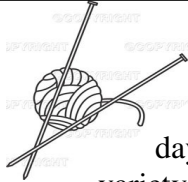

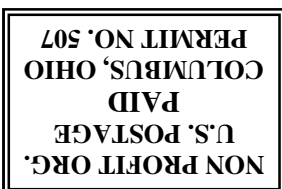
