Dear Covenant friends and family,

Our own stories have seasons of light and darkness - times when things are clear and times when they are uncertain. At its best, the liturgical calendar provides the sound track to the rhythms and patterns of our lives.

The Christian liturgical calendar was designed with the northern hemisphere in mind. Advent and its waiting coincides with the darkening of the days, and Christmas itself falls just a few days after the winter solstice, when it is obvious that the light is returning, that the descent into night is turning around. There's no indication that Jesus was born in the middle of winter, and certainly none that his birthday was December 25. The early Church was wise about encouraging their converts to meld their existing celebrations (winter solstice, evergreens, wreaths, candles, yule logs, gift giving, lots of celebratory eating and drinking) with a new story - the coming of the Light of the world. That seemingly brief stretch between the celebration of Jesus' birth and the remembrance of his death seems

short for a life, but long in the realm of the long, gray days of Ohio winters.

December is a chaotic mix of our yearning for sunshine and our anticipatory call to celebrate. January is when we pack away the tinsel and get our organizational ducks lined up: new officers are ordained and installed, and the work of the church gets some new life breathed into it. February, as the days begin to discernibly lengthen, but winter still has its grip on us, calls us to hold onto hope once again. Lent is late this year, and that makes winter feel longer. Our liturgical rhythms give us music that moves us along, a sound track to shape the meaning of our seasons.

Be sure to read through this newsletter for all the things that offer support and opportunity during this winter!

Sometimes the answer is less. Sometimes less doing can mean more becoming. Herein lies my strategy for this season.

You will notice fewer evening classes, fewer spiritual development and adult learning events, in these pages. It is possible that we will add a couple as the days pass and events happen or interests arise, but this less is intentional. Night flows in with more haste these days, and the cold nips at us. Perhaps it is time

to go out less, to snuggle in with a book or an idea or a journal or the rich and textured Silence that holds us, time to learn within. Having conversed and listened and engaged, perhaps it is time to contemplate, to integrate, to ponder. It is time to rest in God, to be nourished in subtler ways.

On Dec. 2nd we begin the season of Advent. You can pick up an Advent Devotional and a guide to Spiritual Formation for the Winter that Sunday – or you can begin to peruse those things on line, come Monday morning, Dec. 3. Rich experiences will still be here. We will still gather. But less often. The invitation is to move with more intention and from your deep places, to listen for what you need, and to simply be with the Living God.

May this season nourish us all.

Stephen Ministers Imagine this: someone sitting across from you and holding a sacred space. This space is judgment-free, shame-free. This space is full of the Love of Christ and a peace that surpasses understanding. This person listens to you, companions you in your questions, and prays for you. For an hour every week, you can say and question and be in the presence of another who bears God's love and peace and power there just for you. 
